







COURSE OFFERINGS

Before arriving in Oman, Noor Majan students take a comprehensive placement exam online that assigns them to one of 11 levels as defined by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL).

In addition to the core instruction program in MSA, students can arrange to take elective classes for additional fees. These courses are taken privately or as institutional small-group classes for an additional fee.

INTENSIVE MSA PROGRAM

Noor Majan offers 11 levels of Arabic instruction that correspond to the ACTFL's language proficiency levels.

METHODOLOGY

Noor Majan's methodology places equal importance of speaking, reading, writing, and listening and strives for students to advance in all four areas. Instruction time is divided between two distinct concentrations:

- Foundational knowledge in Modern Standard Arabic
- Application of knowledge and skills through media literacy

Throughout both concentrations, Noor Majan utilizes the third edition of *Al Kitaab Fi Ta'allum Al-'Arabiyya* (Mahmoud Al Batal) as the primary course material. Complementary material from *Al Kitaab Al-Asasi (1-3)* (El-Said Badawi), *Modern Standard Arabic* (Eckehard Schultz), and *Ahlan Wa Sahlan* (Mahdi Alosh) may also be used. The media Arabic class in particular draws on authentic and relevant material selected by our instructors to demonstrate real-world applications of the language skills.

We follow the international teaching standards set by the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages and teach Arabic at all eleven ACTFL-defined levels.

LANGUAGE PARTNERS

All Noor Majan students in Muscat* meet with an Omani language partner for a total of two hours a week. This allows students to apply their classroom knowledge to the real world and gain confidence. Language partners more than often become good friends and invite students to accompany them on outings and to cultural events.

Noor Majan's language partners are chosen through a competitive interview process. Once selected, they are given training in effective intercultural communication and language engagement strategies.

THE CAMPUS

The Noor Majan–Muscat campus is located in a modern and multi-story building at the heart of the Al-Khuwair shopping and commercial district. The campus is surrounded by a number of lively restaurants, stores, and cafés and is near essential services such as hospitals and pharmacies.

Noor Majan-Muscat's centralized location places students equidistant from places of interest in Muscat. The campus is located 10 minutes away from the Al-Qurum Beach, the Muscat Royal Opera House, the Sultan Qaboos Grand Mosque, and less than 15 minutes from Muscat International Airport.

PROGRAMS

Programs at the Muscat campus are highly flexible and range from short term programs such as a 4-week winter term, and 4-week, 6-week, and 8-week programs throughout the year. There are also long-term programs for students who want to do a full semester or year abroad. Students can start at any of the 11 levels offered at any time of the year. All programs amount to 25 contact hours per week or 100 contact hours* per month. All students additionally receive two hours of language partner practice every week.

THE HIDDEN PEARL OF THE GULF

Wedged between the sea and the jagged rocks of the Hajar Mountains, Muscat is rather quiet in comparison to its neighbor Dubai. Under the surface of its pearly cityscape, however, is a cosmopolitan culture that speaks to its history as a port for ships from all corners of the globe.



One possible meaning for the name Muscat is "falling-place," a fitting name for a city where merchant ships have dropped their anchors for centuries. Muscat reflects this history in its cultural diversity as a crossroads between East Africa, South Asia, and the entire Arab Gulf. Today, nearly one and a half million people live in the greater Muscat area, including the suburban areas of Muttrah and Seeb.

Different from the dazzling skylines of Dubai or Doha, Oman's capital maintains an unassuming appearance of low, whitewashed buildings. As the country's political capital, the city hosts many of Oman's most spectacular mosques, museums, and cultural sites. Among the most iconic representations of the city are the sprawling Sultan Qaboos Mosque and the Sultan's Palace. Muscat boasts many luxury hotels, shopping centers, and of course, sandy beaches for relaxing getaways. A long coastal road connects Muscat to the Muttrah port, home to a teeming soug. Here, students can put their Arabic to use while shopping for frankincense, Omani handicrafts, Islamic artwork, national clothes, and much more.

Students who come to Muscat enjoy the international environment and social atmosphere to converse with Arabic speakers from across the region. The international airport has economic flights to much of the Arab Gulf, allowing students to get a feel for other Arab cultures and explore the region.

EXCURSIONS

Noor Majan treats culture as an inseparable component of language learning. Thus, students studying in Muscat are invited to participate in semi-weekly cultural excursions around Oman as part of their tuition package. These excursions represent opportunities to explore the country and serve to complement their language studies and are included in the tuition package. Locations of excursions are determined by factors including season, weather, safety, and availability of local hosts and guides.

NIZWA FORT AND SOUO

2 days • History and culture

Immerse yourself in the rich heritage of Nizwa, Oman's de facto cultural and religious capital. Nizwa's market with its live animal auctions and friendly people make it a consistent favorite destination.

AL SHAROIYAH REGION

2 days • Nature and culture

Camp under the starry desert skies in the Sharqiyah Sands natural area and visit a traditional shipbuilding workshop in the coastal city of Sur. Make a stop at the Ras Al Hadd beach to witness sea turtles come ashore to lay eggs (seasonal)

WADI BANI KHALID 1 day • Nature and recreation

Swim in the refreshing waters of a natural wadi (canyon) in Oman's eastern region.

MUTTRAH SOUQ 1 day • Culture

Crisscross Oman's largest traditional market and indulge in some of the country's scents and flavors. Mutrah is an excellent place to pick out gifts and products unique to the Sultanate.

AL DAKHILIYAH REGION 2-3 days • Nature and culture

Trace the alleys of the ancient village of Misfat al-Abriyeen and experience the natural beauty of Jebel Akhdar, one of Oman's most splendid natural areas.





THE CAMPUS

In fall 2022, Noor Majan opened its affiliated Daaris Institute in the interior city of Nizwa with the goal of offering students an alternative, more independent study program.

The Daaris Institute is housed in a building that overlooks the idyllic Nizwa Old Souq and with views of the surrounding Hajar Mountains. With nine classrooms, the institute has the capacity to host 60 students at any given time and is happy to work with university Arabic programs to host groups.

PROGRAMS

Noor Majan's Daaris Institute in Nizwa offers an experience designed with independent learners and explorers in mind. Daaris's fees exclusively cover housing and tuition and offer a more budget-friendly, less structured option. The following programs are offered:

- J-term (January), 4 weeks
- Summer program, 8 or 9 weeks
- Semester term, 15 weeks (fall) or 16 weeks (spring)

While the instruction methods are the same as Noor Majan–Muscat, tuition costs at Daaris do not include structured excursions. Students are therefore encouraged to explore the country independently according to their own budget. Students at Daaris will not be assigned language partners, but will find that Nizwa's lively university community makes it easier to make local Omani friends independently.

Semester students will start at one of three levels for each semester: beginner low, intermediate low, and advanced low. Upon the end of the semester, they can expect to reach beginner high, intermediate high, and advanced high levels respectively. Each month of class consists of 100 contact hours* (25 per week), just as at Noor Majan–Muscat.

A CULTURAL HUB NESTLED IN THE MOUNTAINS

Nizwa serves as Oman's de facto religious capital, with a long history of cultivating Islamic culture and scientific and literary intellect. Its spectacular forts, mountain views, and ancient sugs make it a popular stop for international tourists.



70,000 residents (rank: 10)

When international tourists plan trips to Oman, Nizwa is usually the second city on their lists after Muscat. As the capital of the Al Dakhiliya governorate, Nizwa is part-college town, part-cultural hub with a plentiful touristic offering. Among the town's most popular attractions are:

- Jebel Akhdar and Jebel Shams mountains
- The extensive Nizwa Old Soug and animal auctions
- Falaj Daris UNESCO World Heritage Site
- The 7th-century Al-Qala'a Mosque
- Nizwa Fort

Located at the western edge of the Hajar Mountains, Nizwa is a starting point for travelers to the peaks of Jebel Akhdar and Jebel Shams, in addition to the mountain villages that dot the region. As the site of the Noor Majan's Daaris Institute, Nizwa offers intrepid study abroad students the chance to engage with the local community. A large university means that students have all the more chances to participate in local culture and social events. As a city accustomed to opening its doors to tourists, students will find a pleasantly welcoming atmosphere that facilitates a more independent learning environment.

The Daaris Institute overlooks the Nizwa Old Soug and offers students unparalleled access to Omani lifeways and culture. Students here are encouraged to get out and explore the city, which in a city like Nizwa is a sure way to meet Omanis curious to meet foreign students and establish friendships.













CULTURE AND DIVERSITY




DIVERSITY

Noor Majan's directors have over a decade of experience working with students of a broad range of identities and backgrounds. We work with students' individual situations and are always happy to talk about worries or concerns they may have to ensure their time in Oman is an enjoyable and safe experience. Students with questions about navigating issues of accessibility or identity in Oman are encouraged to reach out to us to ask for advice from our knowledgeable staff. We are more than willing to speak with students about how race gender, disability, and other personal aspects are understood and addressed in Oman.

CULTURAL ACTIVITIES

Students will find that Omani culture is multifaceted, with communities representing the three major sects of Islam in addition to large communities of South and Southeast Asian expatriates. Noor Majan seeks to engage students in meaningful activities to strengthen their understanding of local culture. Noor Majan–Muscat hosts lectures with experts in Arabic on subjects such as "Women in the Gulf" and "The Ibadi Tradition in Oman," among others.

Other regular cultural activities include Arabic movie nights, Omani cooking workshops, Arabic *khaṭṭ* (calligraphy) workshops, outings to museums, galleries, and exhibitions, and cultural exchange activities with Omani students.

STUDENT APARTMENTS

Except for professionals residing in Oman, students at Noor Majan–Muscat or the Daaris Institute stay at our student apartments for the duration of their stay. At both locations, this accommodation is covered by the course fee. The apartments themselves are gender-segregated within a shared building, and both apartments have undergone recent renovations and are outfitted with modern appliances. Their locations have been carefully selected to be within walking distance of restaurants, shops, laundry services, and taxi/bus stops.

Student apartments consist of shared two, three, or four-bedroom apartments. Bedrooms are double occupancy, although students may upgrade their room to single occupancy for an additional fee (when available). The fully equipped kitchen, lounge area, bathrooms, washing machines and flat-screen TVs are for shared usage within one apartment. All apartments are equipped with Wi-Fi internet access. All apartments are equipped with appropriate smoke detectors and air conditioning.

IS OMAN SAFE?

Noor Majan is conscious of the perception of the Middle East as a restive conflict zone. For over 50 years, Oman has been an exception to this regional trend and is consistently rated as among the safest countries in the world. Even with Oman's exceptionally low crime rate, Noor Majan takes student safety seriously and our core staff members are available to answer emergency calls 24/7.

HOW SHOULD I DRESS IN OMAN?

Students at Noor Majan are asked to dress in a way that is considerate of the country's Islamic culture. All students regardless of gender are asked to wear modest clothes that cover their legs to the ankle and arms to the elbow. Omanis welcome foreign students to dress in national clothes (abaya for women and dishdasha for men) if they choose. Women will not be asked to cover their hair except during visits to mosques.

WHAT HEALTH SERVICES ARE AVAILABLE?

At orientation, all students are informed about emergency protocols and health services so they can focus on their studies with peace of mind. Noor Majan maintains contact with local health professionals who speak English, and our staff are always available to accompany sick students on doctor's visits. Students studying at Noor Majan must acquire health insurance for the duration of their stay in the country.

WHAT IS FOOD LIKE IN OMAN?


Students studying at Noor Majan–Muscat are served lunch on class days. All students apartments in both Nizwa and Muscat are equipped with kitchens and modern appliances. Restaurants in Oman often serve Levantine Arab food or Indian food, which have more vegetarian options than home style Omani meals.


RESULTS-DRIVEN
